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Dear Associates

You may, or you may not, have heard of Father (later Bishop) Eugene James Cuskelly MSC. He was an Australian who was born in 1924 in Queensland, exactly 100 years after the birth of Father Jules Chevalier in France. He was professed as a MSC in 1943 and ordained to the priesthood in 1948. A prolific writer, some of his best known books include:

*A Heart to Know Thee (1964), The Kindness of God (1965), No Cowards in the Kingdom (1969), Jules Chevalier-Man with a Mission (1975,) A New Heart and a New Spirit (1976), With a Human Heart (1981). Walking the Way with Jesus (1999) – this, his last book, dedicated to the lay people of the Brisbane Archdiocese, with input from many of them, was written during the final months of his life after being diagnosed with cancer of the esophagus. Of this time his Archbishop, J Bathersby wrote: “No one has edified me more than Bishop James. He approached this time with the deepest faith and courage, as well as a profound desire to use these last precious moments for the benefit of other people. I have come to understand the remarkable treasure that he has brought to the universal Church and to the Archdiocese of Brisbane.”*

Bishop Cuskelly died in March 1999. As a measure of the regard, and affection, with which he was held by his confreres ***Symposium Cuskelly*** was held in Issoudun, September 15-28 2002. This was attended by 85 members of the Chevalier Family – MSC, MSC Sisters, Daughters of OLSH, and Laity. In 2005, which was the Centenary Year of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart in Australia, Father Frank Fletcher MSC (dec. 2011) delivered the E.J. Cuskelly Memorial Lecture. In his introduction he said:

*“Bishop Cuskelly was a man of rare spiritual perception.  
Through his reputation in this regard and through his writings he was elected the  
international Superior of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart [1969].  
After his twelve years in the appointment he was invited*

*by the Archbishop of Brisbane to be an auxiliary bishop in that diocese [1982].  
As leader of the Congregation the archives of the MSC were open to him  
and he brought his mind to bear on the life and writings  
of the MSC founder, Jules Chevalier.*

***He went on to put Chevalier's spirituality  
into approaches more appealing for our time.***

*He laid stress particularly on people's desire for God.  
He recognized such desire as common among all levels of the Church;  
laity, religious and clergy." (Compass, Spring 2005, Vol 39, No 3)*

Father Chevalier and Father Cuskelly, two men with a single dream, two men with a single mission – to make the Sacred Heart of Jesus everywhere known and loved. It is to Bishop Cuskelly that we, as members of the Chevalier Family, owe a debt of gratitude for opening up anew the richness of Father Chevalier's charism, for expressing that charism in words for a new time. For many of his confreres, Bishop Cuskelly is seen as the re-founder of the MSC Congregation. He gave us the expression, "spirituality of the heart". Central to his thought was the text from *1 John 4,16*:

***"We have learned to recognize the love of God in our regard  
and have made it our belief."***

Commenting on these words Bishop Cuskelly explained:

*And when we say that we have learned to believe  
in the love of God manifested in Christ,  
we express the conviction that this love  
is able to give meaning and purpose to all human life;  
that it can answer man's deep questioning  
and quiet the restless human heart.  
This implies that we live what I would call  
**" a spirituality of the heart".***

*(Jules Chevalier-Man with a Mission, page 128).*

Bishop Cuskelly then goes on to elaborate on four "movements" that constitute the living out of such a spirituality. I quote them in full from his book, ***Jules Chevalier-Man with a Mission, pages 128-129.***

1. We have to go down to the depths of our own soul in a realization of our profound personal needs of life, of love and of meaning.
2. We must find, through faith and reflection, the answer to our own questioning in the Heart of Christ, i.e. in the depths of his personality, where man's yearning and God's graciousness meet in redemptive incarnation.
3. Then, fashioned by these forces, our own heart will be an understanding heart, open to, feeling for, and giving to our brothers and sisters in Christ.
4. We will not be *dis-heartened*, or discouraged in the face of difficulties. We follow Christ who "loved with a human heart" as Vatican 11 reminds; he shared our humanness that we might know that over us all is the everlasting love of the Father. In God's good time the omnipotent love of God will have its way. It is *this* love in which we have learned to believe."

Father Peter Campbell, an American MSC, express these four movements in a slightly different way;

### **Movements of the Heart**

1. ***In the first movement of a spirituality of the heart, one encounters Jesus Christ in many ways:*** through Scripture, in the sacraments, in life situations, in prayer and meditation, through other people. Sometimes people can recognize his presence and sometimes they are not sure if or how he is present.
2. ***In the second movement of a spirituality of the heart, people long for a deeper, more intimate encounter with God in Jesus.***
3. ***The third movement in the spirituality of the heart is conversion.***
4. ***The fourth movement of the spirituality of the heart is a desire to share.***

You might like to look it up and find further explanations of each "movement".

Such a treasure we hold with our Charism and Spirituality of the Heart!

Perhaps you might take time to reflect on these four "movements" and see where you stand in appreciating and living out this wonderful gift with which we have been blessed. Let me finish with a stanza from a poem by e.e. cummings which was quoted by Fr Frank Fletcher in the Memorial Lecture mentioned above:

*Here is the deepest secret nobody knows  
(here is the root of the root and the bud of the bud  
and the sky of the sky of a tree called life, which grows  
higher than the soul can hope or mind can hide)  
and this is the wonder that's keeping the stars apart  
I carry your heart (I carry it in my heart)*

Father Fletcher notes that photos and paintings of Father Chevalier show him wearing his black cloak with a large image of the Heart of Jesus worn next to his own heart. Then he says: *“Chevalier was right to wear the Heart of Jesus on his heart.”*



Let us always be grateful that we have the privilege of carrying the Heart of Jesus in our hearts. May Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, our Mother and life-long Companion, stay close to us so that we may be true disciples of the Heart of her Son. United in the Loving Heart of Jesus with Mary

## Section 23

### A Passion for Jesus and a Passion for His People

Central to the vision of both Pope Francis and Fr. Chevalier is their understanding of 'mission' or, the word often used by recent Popes, 'evangelization'. Along with Fr. Chevalier, Pope Francis emphasizes that all Christians are called to take part in Jesus' mission in the world. For both of them, 'mission' or 'evangelization' has to play a vital role in the Church and in the life of every Christian.

The Pope describes 'mission' as 'at once a passion for Jesus and a passion for his people' (Evangelii Gaudium n. 268). In section 8 of this course, we already spoke about Fr. Chevalier's great passion for Jesus Christ. In all his writings, he presented Jesus Christ as the model of our life and mission in Church and society. He invites us to look attentively at Jesus in his public life, so that we may follow him in his mission. What do we see?

*"We see his Heart pour itself out on every sort of misfortune,  
on every sort of misery, moral and physical.*

*All the kindness that Jesus sowed along his path, all the miracles he worked  
are so many outpourings of ineffable goodness of his Heart."*

(Le Sacré Coeur 1900, p. 9).

In the same book, Chevalier elaborates the meaning of this "ineffable goodness" of Jesus, by declaring: "Goodness is gratuitous love." Quoting Fr. Lacordaire OP, a famous preacher of his day, he states: "He is good who loves for the sole happiness that he finds in loving". Pope Francis sees this as the purest motivation for evangelization. He writes:

*"Only the person who feels happiness in seeking the good of others,  
in desiring their happiness, can be a missionary.*

*This openness of the heart is a source of joy,  
since 'it is more blessed to give than to receive'." (Acts 20:35).*

And the Pope points to the many people who are "missionaries" just by the way they carry out their daily commitments:

*"All around us we begin to see nurses with soul,  
teachers with soul, politicians with soul,  
people who have chosen deep down  
to be with others and for others"*

(Evangelii Gaudium n. 272-273).

And, we may add that all around us we also meet parents and children with soul, priests, religious and all kind of workers with soul. These are the people, the Pope says, who live with “a heart attentive to others” (*Evangelii Gaudium* n. 282). They are the people who “generously give” of themselves (*Evangelii Gaudium* n. 274). In Chapter 5 of *Evangelii Gaudium*, the Pope calls them several times “Spirit-filled Evangelizers.”

### ***A Reflective Moment***

*“Isn't it instructive that the spiritual formation of the original disciples happens with Jesus on the road?*

*In effect, the disciples learn by doing.*

*They grow into an understanding of this God of love,  
this God of compassion, this God who loves justice,  
this God who makes all things new,  
by participating as active observers  
and agents of compassion, justice, and newness.*

*And, yes, necessarily, they pause with Jesus to reflect,  
ask questions (sometimes stupid questions), and pray.  
But the spiritual adventure described in the four Gospels  
does not happen in the sanctuary;  
it happens on the road,  
in the company of beggars, prostitutes, and lepers.”*

*(Jack Jezreel, "To Love without Exception," Oneing, Vol. 4 No. 1, p. 51-52)*
